Welcome!



Google Classroom

Oakgrove School uses Google Classroom. As a year team we are keen to support you to have all the information you need in one place. When you start at Oakgrove there will be a Google classroom for Year 7, we will share important information with you via this.

Within the first week of starting, you will be given an email address that you can use to log into Google classroom. Your teachers will also use Google classroom to put up homework, extension tasks and resources for your lessons.

Don't worry about this for now - we will speak more about it in September.

THE FIRST SCHOOL DAY: SEPTEMBER 6th 2023

On the first day the gates will open at 8.20 am. You then need to make your way to the outside of the Theatre, meet your tutor and line up like you did on transition day (there will be letters for each form, so you know where to stand).

Do not worry if you are not sure of where to go there will be somebody to show you the way. Mr Tett (Headteacher), Mr Boon (Senior Deputy Headteacher) and Mrs Ryder (Head of Year) will speak to you all and then your Form Tutor will take you to your form room.

You will be given your timetable and your student planner. There will then be time set aside for you to speak to your form tutor, the other members of your form and have a tour of the school.

The librarian has recommended some good books for you to read over the Summer - they are all based around transition and Secondary School.

Also have a look at some of the homework activities over the summer and bring them to pass to your form tutor - you will receive a merit for each task you complete!

Books about transition to secondary school



Can you see me? Libby Scott and Rebecca Westcott - Tally is autistic and she is about to begin secondary school. This book beautifully brings to life the difficulties young people feel about fitting in and negotiating friendships as they start a new chapter in their life.

The boy who made everyone laugh by Helen Rutter – Billy has a problem which will strike a chord with many: he is about to start secondary school and knows that it will be all too easy for him to become a target for bullies because of his stammer. Both touching and funny this is a brilliant story about being brave, being different and learning that being you is what really matters.

Jamie by L.D. Lapinski - Jamie Rambeau is a happy 11-year-old non-binary kid who likes nothing better than hanging out with their two best friends Daisy and Ash. But when the trio find out that in Year Seven they will be separated into one school for boys and another for girls, their friendship suddenly seems at risk.

Being Miss Nobody by Tamsin Winter - Rosalind hates her new secondary school. She's the weird girl who doesn't talk. The Mute-ant. And it's easy to pick on someone who can't fight back. So Rosalind starts a blog - Miss Nobody; a place to speak up, a place where she has a voice.

The amazing Edie Eckhart by Rosie Jones - We follow the transition from primary to secondary school of Edie, a schoolgirl with cerebral palsy, and her best pal Oscar. The book touches upon coming of age, making friends, trying new things, and of course one of the main narratives of the book, inclusion.

Finding her feet by Eve Ainsworth (Dyslexia friendly) - A shy but talented footballer navigates challenging friendships and anxiety at school in this touching tale.

Finding my voice by Aoife Dooley (Graphic novel) - Frankie is different, and so is her best-friend, Sam. So when they both start secondary school, it's tough. Particularly when there are so many rules to follow.

Go big by Matthew Burton (non-fiction) - whether you're about to land at secondary school or you're still settling in, Mr Burton is here to guide you through your journey – worry-free.
